2020 marks a unique point in the history of Christianity in Europe, and indeed the entire world. This year Christians in many countries are prevented from gathering in person to commemorate and celebrate in Easter services the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ... The reason is legal measures to slow down the spread of the highly contagious Sars-CoV-19 virus and especially for vulnerable groups lethal Covid-19-desease caused by it. The prohibition of Easter celebrations in churches is just one example of far reaching restrictions on the exercise of many human rights and civil liberties world-wide, which are part of an effort to make physical distancing effectively prevent person-to-person infections.

Because there has not been any comparable restriction of religious freedom or many other fundamental rights in modern times, and because these rights are usually seen as the legal backbone of our democracy and the rule of law in Europe the Thematic Group on Human Rights of the Conference of European Churches has closely considered the issues at stake and published a discussion paper. It also recommended to the Conference of European Churches to change the topic of this year's Summer School on Human Rights to reflect further on them.

For the first time in its history, the Summer School will not take place as a physical gathering, but as a series of online seminars.

Do not wash your hands from Democracy, Human Rights and Rule of Law obligations during COVID - 19!

The 2020 COVID—19 pandemic has left most of the human population in a state of shock. The pandemic challenged and affected all fundamental rights in Europe and around the globe. European values such as democracy, human rights and rule of law were affected to such an extent that the European Union and the Council of Europe organised the common initiative - Wash your hands and defend human rights: EU and Council of Europe actions in the time of COVID-19. Two leaders from CEC member churches, Bishop Bosse- Huber from Germany and Metropolitan Emmanuel from France, will each present their analysis on the current state of play. They will share their reflections on the importance of the protection of European values, as well as on the belief that no one should be left behind, and they will respond as church leaders to the question: How has COVID affected Human Rights, Democracy and Rule of Law in Europe?

Challenges for the CEC churches in the time of COVID-19 in the area of Freedom of Religion or Belief and other fundamental rights – case studies

(Session I)

In democratic countries in Europe, democracy, human rights and rule of law are business as usual. In times of normality, the right to freedom of religion or belief is taken for granted by the majority of people in Europe. During the pandemic, European governments reacted in various ways by limiting the right to freedom of religion or belief. Some traditions like the Orthodox one, the practice of the 'shared spoon' (a centuries-old practice for the receiving of communion) raised questions on whether communion is source of health or source of disease. In some Protestant traditions, adapting to the new ways of worship has also proven to be a difficult exercise. How CEC member churches reacted to limits set on religious freedom and how the states of various European countries attempted to derogate from human rights standards will be presented in the 3 webinars.

Monitoring the rule of law in times of Covid-19 – The enhanced rule of law mechanism as a more promising approach to a value-based Europe?

The gradual erosion of the rule of law has been promoted by the unprecedented Covid-19 pandemic. In her agenda for Europe Commission President Ursula von der Leyen underlined that "there can be no compromise when it comes to defending our core values. "She announced to support an additional comprehensive European Rule of Law Mechanism, with an EU-wide scope. Hence, the European Commission has declared to enhance its monitoring of the rule of law in EU member States through a rule of law review cycle. The cornerstone of the initiative is an objective annual report assessing the rule of law situation in all EU member States in order to reflect the idea of a real community of values. The report is to be issued by the European Commission for the first time in September 2020 building on a proposal first advanced by the German and Belgian foreign ministers in 2019. Promoting the rule of law, democracy and fundamental rights is an aim which is among the key priorities of the German Council Presidency starting on July 1. What are the expectations with regard to this new rule of law initiative? What could be keys to turn it into a success? Which roles can churches play in this regard?
